Enrollment Drop Noted Moore Memorial **Hospital Making On Opening School Day Request For Funds**

New Building Lifts Deficit To \$36,500

With a goal set at \$36,500, the Moore Memorial Hospital on Wednesday mailed appeal letters to friends of the institution outlining the need for additional financial support.

Accompanying the letter was an attractive brochure, with illustrations showing the results of the recently completed project which gave the hospital a new administrative wing, emergency wing, pediatric department quarters, heating plant and laundry, laboratories and additional private rooms for patients.

The letter, over the signature of Jack M. Taylor of Aberdeen, president of the institution, reads in part:


