

Civil Court Will Convene Next Week

Some 19 cases, including four uncontested divorces, are scheduled for trial in a one week term of civil court convening in this county Monday.

Judge Walter E. Johnston, Jr., of Winston-Salem, who has been holding court here for the past three terms, will be on the bench again, his last in the current schedule.

Peach Growers To Hold Referendum This Saturday

Peach growers in seven Sandhills counties, including Moore, will vote Saturday on whether or not to assess themselves to promote the sale of their products. The referendum will be limited to those growers who have one acre or more of orchard.

The assessment will be based on one and one-half cents per bearing tree. For purposes of the referendum a bearing tree is described as one three years old or older.

The referendum, called by the North Carolina Mutual Peach Growers' Society, is expected to pass easily enough, as it was discussed and received wide support at a meeting of the organization several months ago in Pinehurst. The present assessment is one cent per tree. Almost \$5,000 will be raised for promotion if the referendum passes.

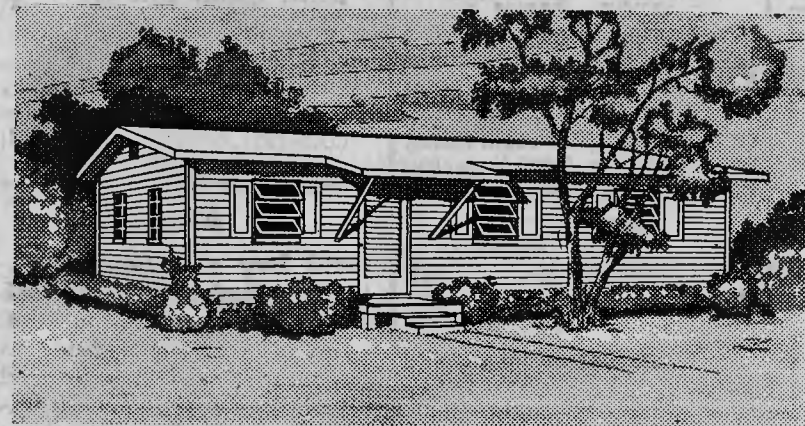

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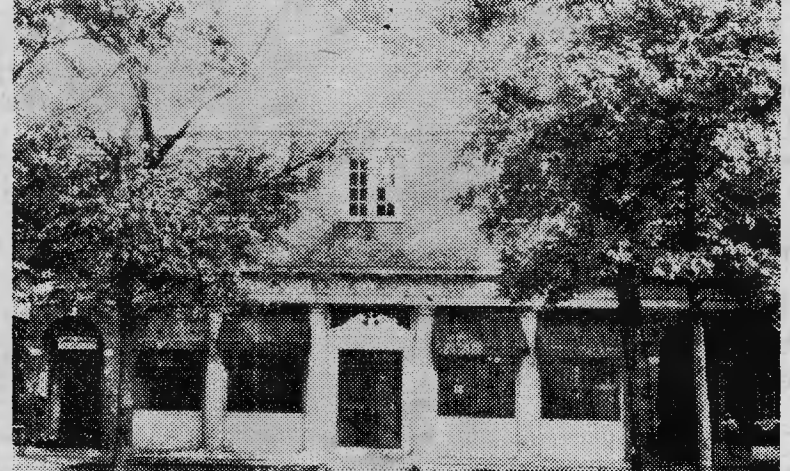
