

Warehousemen described the opening as the best in years. Both poundage and money paid out set a record on the Aberdeen market, said I. A. Barnes, sales supervisor.

Average price paid at the three Aberdeen warehouses was \$62.68. At Carthage the average at the McConneli warehouse was \$63.86 and at the New Victory \$60.81.
