County School Board Planning Consolidation

Member Tells PTA **About Plans For** Moore High Schools

Members of the East Southern Pines Parent-Teacher Association and visitors at the meeting heard an explanation Monday night of the county board of education's plans for high school consolida-

Using charts to explain the organization of the county school system and of the Southern Pines and Pinehurst independent city school units, Jere McKeithen of Aberdeen, a member of the county board of education, told his audience that under the plan the nine high schools of the county system would be consolidated into three super high schools which, he said, would give the taxpayer more for his money and would make possible improvement of curriculum in both college preparatory and vocational education fields.

An alternate plan, which he presented as a suggestion, making it clear that the county board of education has no control in the matter, would include the Southern Pines and Pinehurst systems in the consolidation plan, joining with the Aberdeen school, to form a school with an enrollment (based on present figures) of 721.

He estimated that it would cost about \$3 million to launch such feelings about consolidation, he
