Science Teacher**

Miss Jane Lewis, Science and Homemaking teacher at Farm Life High School, recently received merit awards for her outstanding contributions to scientific research and experimentation in a teacher in-service training program sponsored by NSF and Academy of Science during the current school year.

Woman's College, University of North Carolina, has selected her to participate in their National Science Foundation Summer Institute in Greensboro. She was employed from a field of over 300 participants to engage in laboratory work in the fields of Chemistry and Climatology.

The purpose of these programs is to enable outstanding high school science and math teachers holding Bachelor's degrees and Class A teaching certificates to review important principles and concepts and to learn new developments in scientific fields.

National Science Foundation is also sponsoring an Academic-Year Institute at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. From the hundreds of applications received from teachers in many states, Miss Lewis' application was among the ones chosen. She, along with 44 other selected applicants from various states and
