SOUTHERN PINES RECORDER'S COURT

Stiff Sentence Given to Driver On Several Traffic Law Offenses

Jimmie D. Aikins, Negro who has been staying at a West Southern Pines boarding house but who gave a Florida address as his home, received a stiff suspended sentence on a variety of traffic offenses in Southern Pines Recorder's Court yesterday.

A forcible trespass count, in which he was charged with breaking into the boarding house, rather than waiting to be let in, when he arrived late at night, was not pressed on condition he pay damages done to the house.

The traffic charges were drunken driving, having no operator's permit and going the wrong way on a one-way highway. Judge W. Harry Fullenwider sentenced him to six months on the roads, suspended on payment of \$125 fine and costs and on condition that he not operate a motor vehicle in North Carolina for two years.

Other cases heard yesterday, in which defendants were from Southern Pines or Moore County (if no address is listed, defendant is from Southern Pines) were:
