Norris L. Hodgkins was chosen chairman of the Southern Pines city board of education when the board met last night for the first time with its two new members, J. E. Sandlin and Mrs. Walter Harper. Other members of the board, both present, are Harry J. Menzell and P. I. York.

The new members, appointed by the town council, replaced John M. Howarth and Dr. Vida C. McLeod. Mr. Sandlin and Mrs. Harper signed their official oaths of office last night.

The board authorized the chairman and secretary—Luther A. Adams, schools superintendentto sign a contract with Hayes, Howell and Associates, local architectural firm, to draw preliminary plans for a new West Southern Pines High School, at a cost not to exceed \$4,500, the fee to be credited against the architect's total fee when the school is built.

Estimated to cost between \$200,-000 and \$250,000, the school would replace the present high school which has been severely criticized for its condition by the Moore County grand jury. Funds for the school are being requested from the county commissioners, with likelihood that only a portion of the amount, if any, would be appropriated this year.
