On August 31 there will be a full day of school as students will have secured textbooks and assignments the previous day. High school textbook rental fee will be \$4.50 for this year. Other high school fees and elementary fees will vary.

Under the present plan, the minimum school day for all teachers and principals will include 30 minutes before the opening of school and thirty minutes after the closing of school, unless teachers are excused for any county in-service education program. This extra time before and after school can be utilized for parent-teacher conferences as well as teacher preparation and planning.




