At that time, a 10-day waiting period, during which higher bids may be submitted, will expire. If no higher bid is received by Clerk of Court C. C. Kennedy in Carthage, the building will go to Frederick J. Mahoney of Boston, Mass., on whose behalf the \$35,000 bid was entered at the auction by the Johnson and Johnson law firm of Aberdeen.


