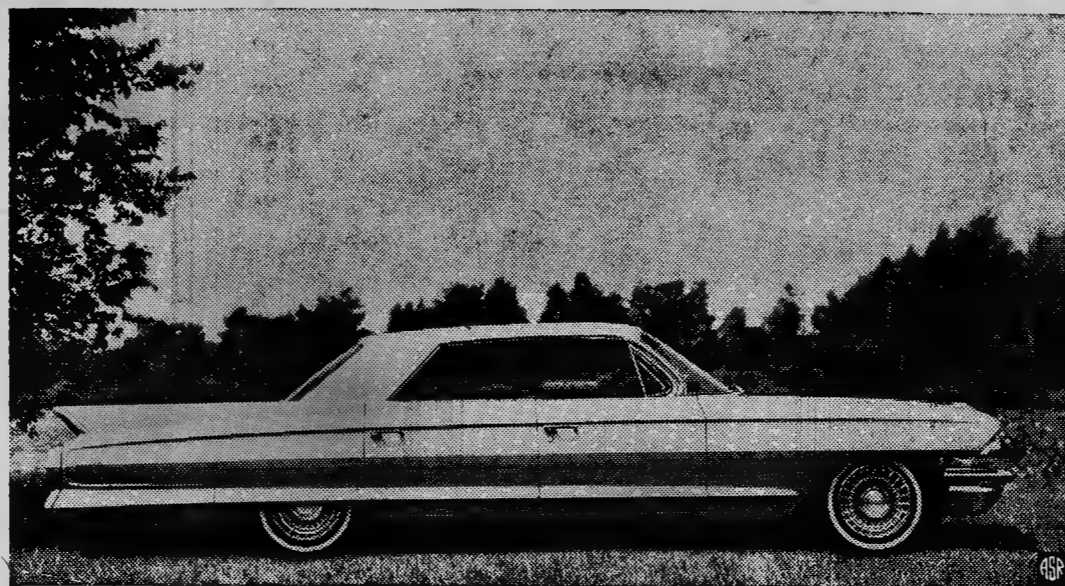

**Young Offenders Figure Prominently In Moore Recorder's Court on Monday**

Teenage offenders figured prominently in cases on the docket of Moore County Recorder's Court Monday—contrasting with one 80-year-old defendant who drew a suspended six months sentence for having illicit whiskey for sale.

Most serious charge against the teenagers was a second offense of drunken driving for Raymond Brown, 18, of Route 2, Carthage, who was also charged with driving without operator's license after his license had been revoked and during the period of revocation. Brown was sentenced to three months on the roads, with sentence suspended on payment of \$200 fine and costs and his operator's license to be revoked for an additional two-year period. For driving without operator's license, David Phillips, 16, of Carthage, was ordered to pay \$25 to include the costs or serve 30 days on the roads.

(Both Brown and Phillips were arrested later this week on separate larceny charges—see another story in today's Pilot). Woodrow Eldridge, 19, of Carthage, was charged with careless and reckless driving causing an accident with personal injury. He was fined \$25 and paid the costs.

Two other teenagers, Grady Monroe Wilson of Robbins and Jerry Davis Wilson of Bear Creek were also charged with careless and reckless driving. However, Judge Rowe found them not guilty of this charge but guilty of speeding in excess of 50 miles per hour in a 45-mile zone and fined them \$10 each, with each also paying court costs. Joe Bennett, 80, of Carthage, was at the other end of the age scale from the young offenders. Charged with possession of illicit whiskey for sale (the State's exhibit included 10 half-gallon jars), he was first sentenced to 90 days in jail, "to do such work as he is able to do in and around the jail," but the sentence was changed to six months in prison camp or jail, suspended for two years on payment of \$150 fine and costs and on condition that he not violate the prohibition laws for two years.

Other cases heard Monday (with the exception of the Thom McKenzie case involving larceny of goods from the former Southern Pine Cottages property, which is reported in a separate story) were: Catherine Parker Denning, Carthage, drunken driving, accident

with property damage, possession of taxpaid liquor, judgment continued on payment of \$100 fine and costs and payment of damages to auto of Ruth Muse, driver's license to be revoked for 12 months; Paul Blue Grady, Carthage, drunken driving, 60 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$100 fine and costs, operator's license to be revoked for 12 months; Cecil Hilton Rowell, Lakeview, driving without operator's license, \$15 and costs, not to drive until he obtains proper license; Grover Cornelius Rowell, Robbins, careless and reckless driving, no operator's license, 30 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$25 to include the costs (nobody injured except defendant and no property damage).

John Robert Andrews, Southern Pines, following another auto too closely, found guilty of operating a motor vehicle at a speed excessive under the facts and circumstances existing at time and place, not guilty of following another car too closely, judgment continued on payment of costs; Gene E. Fowler, Fayetteville, escaping from prison, three months on roads, to begin at expiration of sentence now being served.
