It all had to be started from scratch, beginning with aerial photos. Previous maps, largely inaccurate, and a brief 1927 survey only "caused confusion."

The full survey, which will cost the State about \$35,000, won't be ready for distribution until next May or June, when some 2,500 copies will be available through the State office. It will include the two maps, with legend and symbols in explanation, and a book-length description of the minerals and soils.

In its preparation, initiated in September 1959, Dr. Stuckey paid several visits to the county and Conley has spent most of his time in field work here, partly with n assistant.
