


Mr. Burns, who for years has had a hobby of cooking, is obviously pleased that his long-held dream of operating a local eating establishment has come true.

Attending from this county were W. Lamont Brown of Moore County Recorder's Court at Carthage; Howard C. Broughton of the Southern Pines Recorder's Court and Robert N. Page III of the Aberdeen Recorders' Court. The program for the day-long conference in the Hall of the House included Gov. Terry Sanford, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles Edward Scheidt, representatives of the Traffic Safety Council and three solicitors who spoke or conducted discussions on various aspects of handling traffic cases in the courts.
