

Workmen digging a hole for a new oil tank back of the drug store unearthed the safe and it was removed from the hole and carried away by Mr. May and his wrecker. Mr. Richardson, whose memories of Southern Pines go back more than 50 years, recalled that many years ago, there was no building on the Broad Street Pharmacy corner, but that there were frame buildings west of that location on Pennsylvania Ave., and he thinks the safe may have come from one of the offices in those buildings. There were no indentifying marks of any kind inside or outside the safe.


