### **Manager Named Temporary Civil Defense Director**

Town Manager F. F. (Bud) Rainey was named temporary Southern Pines Civil Defense director by the town council Tuesday night, pending choice of a permanent director by a committee of the council.

The full council was present for the regular monthly session in town hall-Mayor John S. Ruggles, Mayor Pro-tem J. D. Hobbs and Councilmen Felton Capel, Morris Johnson and Fred Pollard. Mr. Rainey and Town Attorney W. Lamont Brown were on hand for the short session, also the town clerk, Mrs. Mildred Mc-Donald.

At last month's meeting, Mr. Johnson and Mr. Pollard were empowered by the council to find and appoint a new CD director to replace John Buchholz who had resigned. Tuesday, the committee of two reported that they had been unsuccessful so far, although they had talked to several men.

"We are trying to find a man interested enough to do the work," Mr. Johnson said. "Evidently, it's going to be a big job."


