## Youths Plead Guilty

Four youths apprehended by officers in Wake County last week, when they tried to sell a battery which they admitted having stolen along with four cans of oil, from an Esso station next 12 months, appeal noted, in Aberdeen, pleaded guilty to bond set at \$50 larceny of the items and were sentenced to 60 days each in jail.
