A race for sheriff was in prospect for the May Democratic primary in Moore County, shortly before the noon filing deadline Friday, when C. G. Wimberly of Aberdeen filed against incumbent W. B. Kelly, but Wimberly withdrew as a candidate this week, in the interest of party harmo-

A former State Highway Patrolman, Wimberly resigned four years ago to run for sheriff and was defeated by Kelly in a runoff. He has recently been working as water plant operator for the Town of Aberdeen. Sheriff Kelly is a former State Highway Patrol corporal.

The end of filing time Friday produced only three Democratic races: T. Roy Phillips of Carthage, of the county board of education is opposed in District 1 by H. Lee Thomas of Carthage, former county superintendent of schools, while J. A. Culbertson, Robbins, who is serving as chairman, faces Mrs. John L. Frye of Robbins in District 2. There is a three-way race for coroner, with candidates W. K. Carpenter, Sr., of Pinebluff, E. R. Kerns of Car-thage and J. W. Cranford of Robbins all seeking the office.


