Plague of Forest Fires Hits Moore; **Peril Stays Great**

Moore county has had so many forest fires during the past week "we just haven't had time to stop and count them all, much less figure up exact acreages and damage," said County Ranger Travis G. Wicker Tuesday night.

Main fires Tuesday were one in a deep pine thicket near the Pinehurst race track, kept confined to about an acre; one on Charlie Cheek's place near Glendon, and another near Cameron, both confined to about two acres.

Most of the fires, he said, were kept small as "our firespotters are really on the alert and we are jumping on the fires as soon as the first smoke is seen. If we don't, there's no telling where they'll go, as the woods are just about as dry as they can be.

Moore was one of 20 counties added Monday to a long list in which all brush-burning privileges were revoked-shortly before State Forester Fred G. Claridge placed all counties having State Forest Service protection, some 92 in all, under the

The dry spell hasn't been so long but a steady wind blowing practically all during the month April—"lots worse than in (Continued on Page 8)


