





Vass Dies; Rites Held Saturday

Mrs. Walter B. Graham, 81, of Vass died Friday morning after several years of invalidism. She was the former Loula Cameron, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus Cameron who were prominent among the early settlers of what is now the town of Vass. Her late husband engaged in the lumber business and was connected with the Vass Cotton Mill for a number of years.

Mrs. Graham attended Littleton College. She was a member of the Vass Methodist Church, a charter member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and of the Vass Woman's Club, and was for many years in charge of the children's department of the Sunday School. She also served as organist. As long as her health permitted, she was active in all community affairs and her home was one of warm hospitality.

Funeral services were conducted at 3 p. m. Saturday in the Vass Methodist Church by her pastor, the Rev. David Moe, assisted by a former pastor, the Rev. T. J. Whitehead of Graham, and a nephew, the Rev. Angus Cameron of Jackson. The church choir, augmented by friends from the Presbyterian Church, sang one of her favorite hymns, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," and Mrs. David Moe sang "Beyond the Sunset," with Mrs. W. E. Gladstone as accompanist
