

**FROM SEAT BELT SALE

Milton E. Jones**

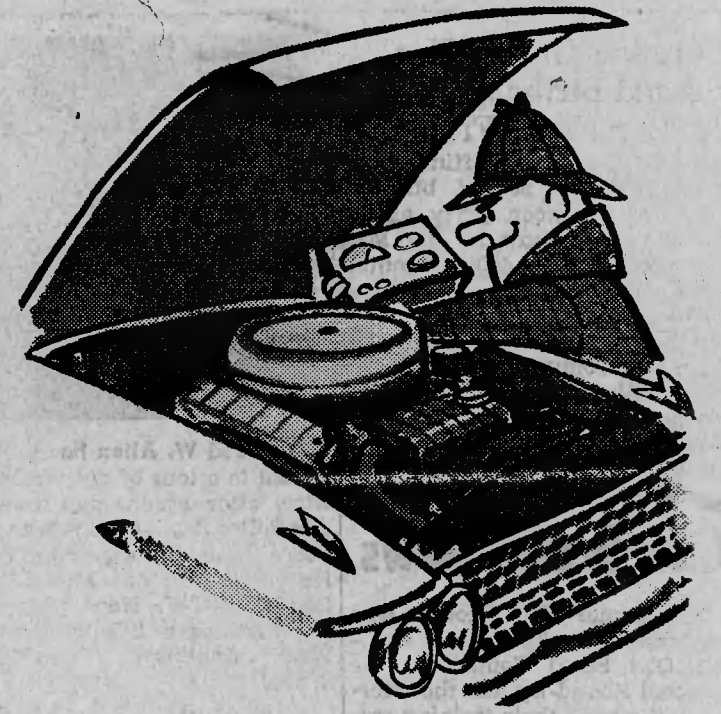
