# **Trooper Hight** Dies Today From Wreck Injuries

State Trooper Henry A. Hight, Jr., 33, of Carthage died at 8:30 a.m. today at Moore Memorial Hospital of injuries suffered Saturday morning, when his car was involved in a collision near Carthage while he was answering a wreck call.

His condition had been rated 'extremely critical" and continued so despite great efforts to save him. An operation Sunday revealed extensive internal injuries. Wednesday, a specialist in internal medicine was relayed to the hospital from Duke Hospital by the State Highway Patrol, remaining to work with attending physicians for several hours before being escorted back to Durham last night.

Hight was a native of Sanford. Funeral services will be held at Miller Funeral Chapel there Saturday at 2 p.m., conducted by the Rev. Roy Morris and the Rev. Clay Ferrell, of Sanford, and the Rev. C. A. Kirby, pastor of Trooper Hight's church, the First Baptist, of Carthage. Graveside ser-vice at Jones Chapel Cemetery near Sanford will be in charge of the Carthage Masonic Lodge, of which he was a member.

Surviving are his wife, the former Doris Norwood; a young son, Roy Van, and daughter, Karen Jo; and his mother, Mrs. Lola Smith Taylor of Sanford.




