

Moore Library Joins 3-County Regional Plan

The Moore County commissioners on Monday agreed to join in with Richmond and Montgomery Counties in the organization of the Sandhill Regional Library, with joint administration and the pooling of state and federal

They adopted a resolution which was also presented Monday to the commissioners of the other participating counties.

The plan, which had been worked out in several meetings with the other boards and discussed fully with the commissioners, was presented Monday by W. S. Evans, chairman, and Mrs. A. P. Phillips of Cameron, of the Moore Library board.

Under new regulations of the State Library Commission, each participating library continues entirely autonomous, with local funds budgeted as before, while state funds, and the federal grant now available only on a regional basis, support a joint administration and central purchasing to "get the most out of the library dollar."

Members from each of the three library boards will compose a regional board, and the resolution authorized this board to establish the library on or after (Continued on Page 8)
