

Registration For Town, **Council's Action To Make Possible Big Development** Meeting Tuesday night in reg-

ular monthly session, the town council approved modifications of restrictions on about 33 acres of property included in the water supply lake's watershed, to permit construction of a golf course and uses incident to a golf course.

The land is part of a larger tract being bought by C. A. Pitts of Manly from W. O. Moss, for a proposed hotel, country club and golf course project. The tract lies north of Midland Road, between Southern Pines and Pinehurst, and west of the Southern Pines-Carthage road.

On hearing from Town Manager F. F.
