Friday, February 1, will mark the inauguration of Extended Area telephone service between Pinehurst and Aberdeen, according to Joe R. Kimball, district manager of the United Telephone Company of the Carolinas, Inc.

"At the time the new EAS calling area goes into effect. Pinehurst customers will be able to dial toll-free approximately 1,200 additional telephones," Mr. Kimball said. Another point of interest to Pinehurst customers is the fact that the new service will not mean an increase in local service

The provision of EAS between the two neighboring communities has been a joint project of the Sandhill Telephone Company of Aberdeen and the United Telephone Company of the Carolinas, Inc., with headquarters in Southern Pines. Additional equipment has been installed by both the companies to make the service

The February 1 change will complete the long-planned project of toll-free telephone service around the Southern Pines-Aberdeen-Pinehurst triangle. For about the past five years, Extended Area Service has been in use between Southern Pines and Pinehurst and Southern Pines and Aberdeen, but the Aberdeen-Pinehurst service has been deferred pending installation of more equipment by both the companies

"We sincerely hope that this additional Extended Area Service will in some measure contribute to the development of the Sandhills area," Mr. Kimball said.
