

Larceny, Forgery **Charged In Moore Recorder's Court** Floyd Criscoe, 19-year-old





Jonas Sends Out Questionnaires On Current Issues

Congressman Charles Raper Jonas has begun an extensive polling of the views of Eighth Congressional District residents on current issues.

He said questionnaires have been sent to district residents, with the questions ranging from opinions on tax cuts, aid-to-education and the "Domestic Peace Corps" to the Cuban controversy and foreign aid. In all, 10 subjects are included on the 1963 questionnaire with a total of 21 yes-and-no answer blocks. Additional comments are invited.

Based on response to Congressman Jonas's previous questionnaires, about 10,000 replies are expected. The results will be published in The Congressional Record and made available to anyone interested after the answers are tabulated.

Congressman Jonas added, "Any person who does not receive a questionnaire that would like one can just drop me a note at my Washington office (1010 New House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C.) and I'll be glad to send them one."

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
