

MOORE COUNTY RECORDER'S COURT

Man Gets Suspended Sentence For Disposing Of Mortgaged Property

Billy Eugene Mitchell, 23-year-old Negro of Carthage Rt. 3, pleaded guilty in Moore County Recorder's Court Monday of having disposed of mortgaged property without the permission of the holder of the chattel mortgage, Hallum Furniture Co. of Aberdeen.

D. L. Currie of the Hallum store said Mitchell bought a television set and antenna, also a used washing machine, July 16, signing a conditional sales contract. Deputy Sheriff R. A. Edwards, serving a claim and delivery paper later on Mitchell, said he searched for the merchandise at Mitchell's home and found none of it there.

Mitchell drew a six months' road sentence, which Judge J. Vance Rowe then suspended for two years on payment of \$10 and costs and all the balance due on the merchandise, amounting to \$157.45, which the judge said he could pay off at the rate of \$10 per week.

Davis, Bennettsville, and John Wesley Wilson, Bennettsville, Rt. 1, unlawful possession of illicit whiskey, 30 days each suspended on payment of costs; Walter Ellis McPherson, Rockingham, Rt. 2, speeding 60 in 45-mile zone, \$20 and costs; Charlie Chatt, Eagle Springs, violation of license limitation, judgment continued on payment of costs, not to drive till he gets his glasses repaired.

Zoning Ordinance Violation Charged In Case Going To Grand Jury Monday

The case of a Southern Pines citizen arrested on a warrant taken out by the town manager for violation of the town zoning ordinance is slated for presentation to the grand jury when a term of Moore County Superior Court for trial of criminal cases opens in Carthage Monday.

Leland M. Daniels, Jr., who is in the construction business, was arrested June 11 on the indictment of F. F. Rainey, town manager. He is charged with "unlawfully and wilfully violating provisions of the zoning ordinance of the Town of Southern Pines by using a portion of his property in the Residential II district, as defined in said ordinance, for a purpose not permitted by said ordinance, to wit: Did and is continuing to use a portion of said prop-

erty for the maintenance of a storage shed and area for the furtherance of the construction business operated by defendant, and has failed and refused to remove said storage shed and the construction materials stored on said property after being given notice to remove same, as required by Section XVII of said ordinance."

Brought into Southern Pines Recorder's Court on the warrant, the defendant demanded a jury trial before any evidence was taken, and the case was transferred to Moore County Superior Court for grand jury action at the August term.

Listed as state's witnesses are Rainey, Walter C. Coffin, Jonas F. Davis, Jr., and George P. Nevens, Jr., the last three all neighbors of the Daniels home on N. Ridge St.
