


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Southern Pines Recorders Court
 Cases heard by Judge W. Harry Fullenwider in Southern Pines Recorder's Court, at the regular Wednesday weekly session of the court last week, were:
 James W. Cole, Route 2, Cameron, trespass, public drunkenness (two charges), indecent exposure, judgment continued on payment of costs and on condition he not be found in any place selling alcoholic beverages or be away from home after 6 p.m. unless in the company of his parents; Charles Ervin Peale, Route 1, Cameron, drunken driving, improper registration plate, jury trial requested, case transferred to Superior Court; Marvin Fulton Gay, driving on wrong side of road, \$20 and costs, also disobeying stop sign, pay costs; Guster Douglas, drunken driving, hit and run, property damage, not pros with leave, prosecuting witness to pay costs.
 Amy Faye Thomas, speeding 45 in 35 zone, \$10 and costs; William D. Wheeler, Fort Bragg, no operator's license, \$25 and costs; Michael C. Bates, Fort Bragg, no operator's license, pay costs and walk to Howard Johnson's Restaurant and back (at option of defendant in place of paying a fine); Kenton Archibald Blue, speeding 50 in 35 zone, \$15 and costs; John Daly Scott, disregarding stop sign, not guilty; George E. Terry, no operator's license, \$25 and costs (defendant is serving 30-day sentence for failure to comply); Arthur Lucas, driving after license was revoked, one year on the roads, appeal to Superior Court entered, bond set at \$1,000; Andrew Cornelius Spencer, hit and run, pay costs and be confined to jail until 6 p.m. on day of trial, to be given driver's license manual to read.
 Barney Comer, Route 2, Vass, assault with deadly weapon (three charges), three months on the roads to run concurrently with sentence invoked from former case tried in May (two of the new charges not pressed); Eli Williams, Jr., assault, forcible trespass, defendant not to go to premises of Wilbur Terry or will have active jail sentence; Lena Mae Johnson, assault, no pros with leave on payment of costs.
 Paying \$10 fines and court costs on charges of public drunkenness were: Charles Alton Sheffield, Route 2, Robbins; Norman F. Scarborough; Ernest W. Barefoot, Raeford; Leroy Harris, Route 3, Carthage; Johnny E. Barefoot, Jacksonville, Fla.; and John Williams, Henley St., West Southern Pines. On the same charge, William H. Halbert of Hendersonville, paid court costs only.

MOORE COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT
5 Uncontested Divorces Granted, Steps Taken In 2 Land Disputes
 Five uncontested divorces were granted and surveyors appointed to mark out boundaries in two land dispute cases on Tuesday, the opening day of the regular two-week civil term of Moore County Superior Court.
 Resident Judge John D. McConnell of Southern Pines is presiding over both weeks of the term.
 The divorces, all granted on two years' separation, were as follows: Mary Agnes Scarboro vs. Roy Lee Scarboro; Rebecca Futrell Greene vs. Charles Reid Greene; Noah Osborn King vs. Lucille W. King; Robert Lee Davis vs. Joan Cheatham Davis; Arthur Edwin Raper vs. Barbara Wright Raper.
 A survey was ordered in the boundary dispute case W. V. Fisher vs. J. Allen Denny and wife Jessie Cooper Denny.
 A surveyor was appointed to establish a dividing line and also, with the help of a forester to be employed if needed, to determine how many trees were cut on the plaintiffs' land about November, 1957, in the suit of Harold Williams, administrator of the estate of Maggie Williams, deceased, and Harold Williams, sole heir at law and next of kin of Maggie Williams, deceased, vs. J. C. Burns, Jr., alias Bud Burns, Robert Thompson and Edna Taylor. The parties reserved the right to object to the line which might be established by the surveyor, and to the number of trees he might determine to have been cut about November, 1957.

Suits Filed On Alleged Cut-Off Of Stream Water
 Two suits have been filed in Moore County Superior Court against Sandhills Properties, Inc., developers of the Whispering Pines, for alleged cutting off the waters of Wateree Branch by damming them up to create a new lake.
 In identical suits, C. S. Bibey and Harvey Wilson, owners of farmlands in McNeill's Township, each claims his crop has been damaged already this year to the extent of \$3,500. Seeking recovery of this amount, each farmer also asks to have Sandhills Properties restrained and enjoined from continuing the impoundment of the stream.
 The plaintiffs state that Wateree Branch, running through their property, has been a source of water for irrigation and other uses over the years until this year. They state the dam erected by the defendant has effectively cut off all the water of the small stream, with no overflow, in violation of their legal riparian rights.

Legion Post 134, Auxiliary Plan Tuesday Meeting
 After a summer recess, the American Legion, Sandhill Post 134, and its Auxiliary will meet jointly at the Legion Hall on E. Maine Ave. Tuesday at 8 p. m. Commander Dan McNeill has ordered "The John Glenn Story" for the program, a film sponsored by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.
