

MOORE COUNTY RECORDER'S COURT

Young Speeders, Caught Driving 75 Side By Side, Lose Their Licenses

Two young Carthage men, Alvin Underwood Fry, 19, and Harold Layne Badgett, 23, pleaded not guilty at Carthage Monday, in Moore County Recorders Court, to speeding 75 in a 60-mile zone.

Instead, they tendered a plea of guilty to speeding 70, but were found guilty as charged.

Constable L. F. Wood of Greenwood Township testified he first noticed the pair on the highway at Cameron because of their high speed, and because they were driving one directly behind the other—"bumper to bumper," the officer said. Before getting them stopped, he said, he clocked them at speeds higher than 75. Though they were running side by side at this time, he did not charge them with racing on the highway.

It was the second speeding charge of the day for defendant Fry, who had earlier pleaded guilty to 70 in a 55-mile zone, drawing a fine of \$20 and costs. Defense counsel, speaking up for both youths said Fry knew he could not avoid license suspension and was prepared to take his punishment, but he put up a special plea for young Badgett. The defense attorney, W. D. Sabiston, said the youth made his living driving a truck, also that his wife was to have a baby in June. He asked that judgment be continued for Badgett until after the baby's birth, so that he could take his wife to the hospital and drive back and forth at that time as needed.

Judge J. Vance Rowe, however, continued prayer for judgment for both youths on payment of \$25 fine and costs, each, leaving the law regarding their license suspensions to operate as it was designed to do.

Traffic law violations and family troubles predominated on Monday's docket. Other cases disposed of:

Howard Franklin Moore, Robbins, Rt. 2, speeding 65 in a 55-mile zone, \$10 and costs; Willie Thomas Welch, Robbins, Rt. 1, speeding 45 in 35-mile zone, \$10 and costs; Pelly Webster Hussey, Robbins, careless and reckless driving, accident and personal injury, \$25 and costs, defendant to pay or cause to be paid damage and injury resulting from wreck; Nelson Randolph Wooten, Carthage, driving without license (3rd offense), and without chauffeur's license as his own, 30 days to be served at expiration of 6-months sentence suspended April 13,

commitment now ordered to issue; Terry Alton Marsh, West End, allowing unlicensed person to operate his auto, and allowing him to use his license, 30 days suspended for six months on payment of \$25 and costs, to commit no similar offense in the suspension period.

Harold David Blake, Box 53, Lakeview, speeding 65 in 55-mile zone, \$10 and costs; Alexander Jones, Durham, speeding 70 in 55-mile zone, \$20 and costs; Gerry Nelson Fry, Pinehurst, speeding 70 in 55-mile zone, \$20 and costs; Louis McLaughlin, Southern Pines, non-support of three children, abandonment of wife and children six months suspended on payment of costs, defendant to return to his wife and children and support them to the best of his ability, or \$25 and costs, \$50 to be paid to his wife, then \$30 weekly toward her support and that of the children till further order of the court.

Russell Van Criscoe, Seagrove, Route 1, speeding 70 in 55-mile zone, \$20 and costs; Hugh Bryant Morgan, Carthage, assault with deadly weapon on female (two counts), both defendant and wife Ossia Morgan found guilty of engaging in affray (male defendant acquitted of assault with deadly weapon), 30 days in jail for each, the male defendant to be assigned to the roads, suspended for 12 months as to each, on payment of costs and good behavior toward each other; Mitchell Ray Smith, Hamlet, abandonment and non-support, 60 days suspended on payment of costs and \$10 per week toward support of wife, till further order of the court; Homer Neil Cooper, Fort Bragg, driving without license, nol pros with leave.

Ray Brower, Jackson Springs, assault and battery on female, assault with deadly weapon, 30 days suspended for 12 months on payment of costs and good behavior toward wife, defendant to get a job and help wife in support of family, also to be examined by a physician and take treatment as recommended; Clinton Williams, Robbins, failure to comply, defendant to be released from jail where he was placed April 7 charged with violation of probation, to get a job and pay \$12.50 per week toward support of family till further order of the court, to stay away from wife's home and in no way molest her, not to appear in any public place nor at his home while to any extent intoxicated, to be under su-
