Sealed proposals will be received by the Sanitary District Board, Taylortown Sanitary District, Pinehurst, North Carolina, until 2:00 p.m. E.S.T., January 14, 1965 at the Taylortown Masonic Hall, Pinehurst, North Carolina for the drilling, developing and testing of two 8-inch deep wells for the Taylortown Sanitary District, Pinehurst, N. C.

Each bid must be accompanied by a cash deposit, a certified check drawn on a bank authorized to do business in North Carolina, or a bidder's bond, for five percent (5%) of the amount of the bid, made payable to the Taylortown Sanitary District, as guarantee that contact will be entered into by the bidder within ten days after notification of award of the contract and that required bond will be executed.

Copies of the proposal, contract, and specifications, etc., may be obtained upon application to the Engineers accompanied by a deposit of ten dollars (\$10.00). A performance bond is required in an amount of 100 percent of the contract price, conditioned on the faithful performance of the contract and upon the payment in full to all persons supplying labor and furnishing materials for and in connections with the construction of the project.

Attention of bidders is particularly called to the requirements as to conditions of employment to be observed and minimum wage rates to be paid under the contract.
