(Also to be voted on would be a county-wide supplementary school tax not to exceed 30 cents per \$100 of property valuation).

The major change approved farther toward the airport and Monday was in the proposed reorganization of the county board of education, to be upped, if the vote carries, from its present five Sandhills Community College to seven members. In a former version, there would have been two each from Areas I and II, and three from the more densely populated Area III, which in-
