tal number immunized in three successive "Measles Sundays" in Moore County, said Dr. A. L. Siege, county public healtn Immunization sessions had

previously been held May 7 at Carthage and Vass, and May 14 at Southern Pines. Use of the mass "injector gun," a new quick-and-easy method which forces a spray through the skin, made it possible to handle large numbers in a comparatively short time. While most of those vaccinated were pre-school children, older children and also some adults lined up for the shots.

Injections will continue to be given those requesting them at the Moore County Health Center, where there is no charge, and are also being given by private physicians, said Dr. Siege, adding, "While we consider that we had an excellent turnout, we hope everyone else who hasn't had red measles' will seek immunization."
