The financial impasse preventing the opening of Pinecrest school in 1968, as planned, was causing concern to both the commissioners and taxpayers, Chairman Currie wrote, expressing the hope that "you can come up with some workable suggestions and plans.'

The letter, read by Jere Mc-Keithen, chairman of the education board, noted that "it will take some hard study and effort on the part of the capable men and women working out these problems, and it will not dissolve itself unless your board can come up with some real facts and figures that we can use."

The Pinecrest Advisory Council, which had requested a conference at the meeting. came with proposals which had been developed, and were presented, by Albert Tufts, who said "This is a sharing of ideas. not a solution, which will call for study and discussion and will need cooperation on the part of everyone.'
