

Ceremony Opens World Team Golf Event

An impressive and memorable ceremony witnessed by several hundred persons at the Pinehurst Country Club, Monday afternoon, opened a week's activity in the first World Senior Amateur Team Golf Championship in which four-man teams from 11 nations or other areas of the world are taking part. Play in the tournament begins today, to run through Saturday.
