# Stock Dividend, Split, Sale Of **Debentures** Set

CAROLINA BANK

During a special meeting last week, stockholders of The Carolina Bank approved a 50 per cent stock dividend, a two-for-one stock split and the sale of \$800,000 in convertible debentures, W. J. Morgan, senior vice president, reports.

With headquarters in Sanford, the bank has Moore County offices at Pinehurst. Aberdeen, Carthage, Vass and West End.

The common stock dividend and the split will, in effect, mean that stockholders will own three shares of stock for each share presently owned with par value being reduced from \$10 to \$5, the bank official said.

Stockholders approved the sale of \$800,000 in 10-year, 51/2 per cent debentures, with each \$500 debenture convertible into 15 shares of stock at the owner's option. The sale of debentures will be made sometime in November or December, with present stockholders having pre-empted rights to purchase their proportionate share, it was stated.

The necessity for the debentures has been brought about due to the rapid growth of the bank's deposits, said L. (Continued on Page 2)
