North Carolina's two Welcome Centers hit the 100,000 visitors mark during the first four months of calendar year 1969. According to Director Bill F. Hensley of the Department of Conservation and Development, Travel and Promotion Division, the two centers attracted an estimated 109,992 persons during the January-April period. The I-95 Center near Roanoke Rapids had the highest estimated total for one month with 21,582 in April. The I-85 Center at Norlina's top figure was 13,985, also in April. This is the first full year of operation for the two centers which were dedicated last fall.
