Far-reaching proposals of the Moore County Planning Board were presented Monday to the county commissioners in regular meeting by Leonard Tufts, chairman.

Tufts, accompanied by Planning Board members Bill Gentry and Jere McKeithen, offered three recommendations in the form of resolutions adopted by the planning board, starting off with a request for advice.

The Planning Board appearance was one of many for the county commissioners, on which two new members-Tony Park and Carolyn Blue-joined three holdover members. At the organizational meeting W.S. Taylor was reelected chairman. Recalling that the RUDAT study-which he said his board has studied well and taken seriously-had suggested that a closer relationship between the county planning board, and those of the various county towns would be to the advantage of them all, Tufts said, "We would like to develop such a relationship, which could be helpful in several ways, such as making sure our ordinances are not in conflict.

> He noted that the area zoned by the county is, generally speaking, close to the four communities which have zoning-Aberdeen, Southern Pines, Vass and Whispering Pines, the first three also zoning the one-mile perimeter, and close cooperation should be helpful to them all. 
