The plant will be erected on a 25-acre site, originally part of the Fred Taylor estate. The area is zoned for industry and is already occupied by several industries. Aro will initiate a training program for new employes in 1979, and it is expected that the plant will reach full strength of 400 employes by 1982.

Moore County officials received the news with jubilation.

In welcoming the "new corporate citizen," Lee Lee Williams, chairman of the Moore County Board of Commissioners, said: "We are most fortunate to have been selected as the site for their new plant."

Through the restraining order, the plaintiffs seek to prevent the Pinehurst Village Council from employing a village manager, an act which they contend is not within the council's authority. The class action suit was filed by James F. Thompson, A. Parker Hall, C.R. McIver, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fisher.

Dies Monday At Age 96 Mrs. George Catlett Marshall, the former Katherine Tupper Brown and widow of the famous author of the Marshall Plan, a longtime resident of Pinehurst, 96, died Monday night in Lees-

burg, Va. The funeral service will be held Thursday (tomorrow) at 3 p.m. in the Fort Myer, Va. Chapel. Gen. Marshall died in 1959, after serving as General of the Army, Secretary of State in 1947-1949, and Secretary of Defense, and being the only military person ever to receive the Nobel

"Marshall Park" in Pinehurst is a memorial to him, as is a research center in Lexington, Va. dedicated by Presidents Johnson and Eisenhower in 1964.

Mrs. Marshall was born in Harrodsburg, Ky. and attended Vassar College and graduated
