Wiffi Smith Returning To Her First Love--Golf

Wiffi Smith, one of golf's most colorful and talented competitors, returns to teaching, and will offer private lessons and intensive golfing seminars at the Lawn & Tennis Club of North Carolina, owner Dennis O'Leary said.
Wiffi took up golf at age 14, in Guadalajara, Mexico—won her first tournament that year. Four years later, she was USGA Junior Champion.
As an amateur, she dominated the sport, sweeping the Tam O'Shanter World and All-American Trans-Mississippi, North and South, Low Amateur in the Titleholders, Mexican, French and British Open titles. She played on the 1956 USGA Curtis Cup team, before turning pro the following year.
As a lady pro she won the Dallas Open; the Peach Blossom three years running, and never finished out of the money. With 34 titles to her credit, at the age of 24, two tragic accidents involving both hands sidelined a brilliant tournament career.
She turned to her second love, horses, and served as whip and kennel huntsman for the Moore County Hounds, one of the oldest

private packs of foxhounds in the South.
But the lure of golf was too strong. She's back full time offering private lessons and three-day intensive golfing seminars, limited to three or four ladies, customized to each participant's needs.
"Many women prefer to take lessons from a lady pro," said Wiffi. "We're offering at the Lawn & Tennis Club basic swing analysis, and all aspects of the game—including playing lessons."

Wiffi has given clinics in Europe, Mexico and the United States, and taught for the past 11 years at Peggy Kirk Bell's Golfaris at Pine Needles.

Jack is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Pettine of Southern Pines. He played his high school football for Coach Burgin Beale at Pinecrest High School. He lettered in football for two years and was named to the All-Conference team. In

addition, he lettered in wrestling for one year.
"We are extremely pleased to sign a player of Jack's caliber," Campbell said. "We believe that Jack can be a quality athlete at Lees-McRae and he has also impressed us as a quality young man. His credits and recommendations are very high and we expect him to be an asset to our program."
The Bobcats are one of the outstanding junior college football teams in the nation. They have been ranked in the top 20 junior colleges over the past ten years and are noted for producing junior college All-Americans and outstanding senior college prospects. The Bobcats have a long-standing football tradition, having fielded their first team in 1930. The 'Cats have participated in five post season bowl games.
The Bobcats played in the tough Coastal Conference of the NJCAA and play a schedule with national junior college powers in the East: Ferrum College (Virginia), Wesley College (Delaware), Potomac State College (West Virginia), Nassau Community College (New York), Westchester Community College (New York), Hudson Valley College (New York), and Chowan College (North Carolina).
