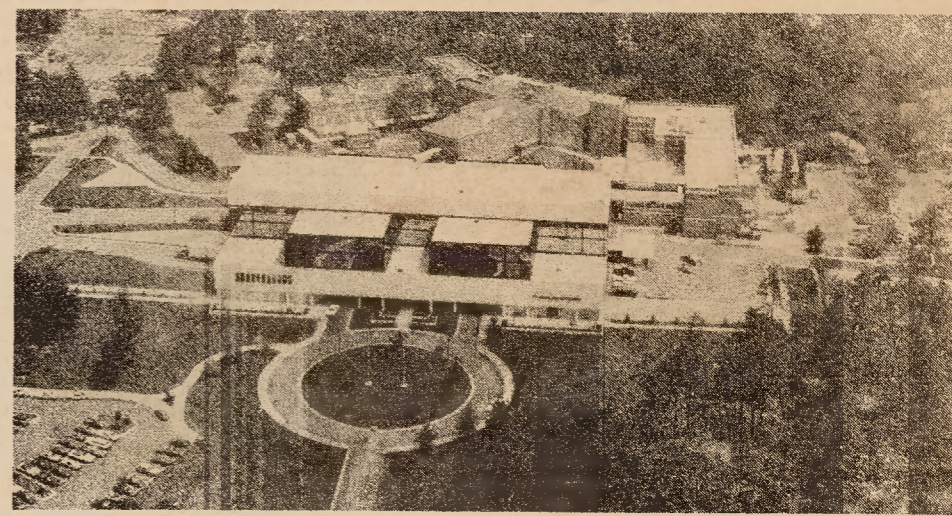

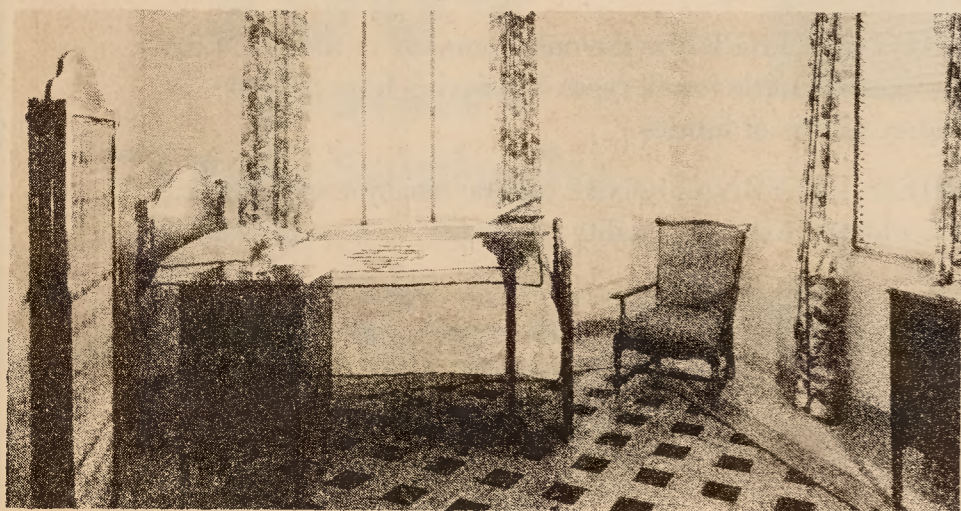

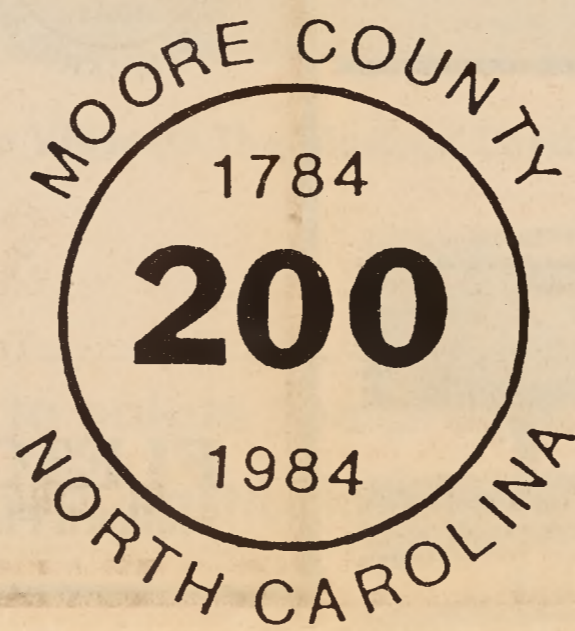

MMH HOSPITAL, 1984 — Called a "premier" acute hospital by experts, MMH has become an important regional institution. Every major medical specialty is represented on the staff, and more than 13,000 in-patients and 44,000 emergency/out-patients will benefit from its existence in 1984. The name of the hospital was changed from Moore County Hospital to Moore Memorial Hospital in 1957. The hospital has always been a private, non-profit charitable institution.

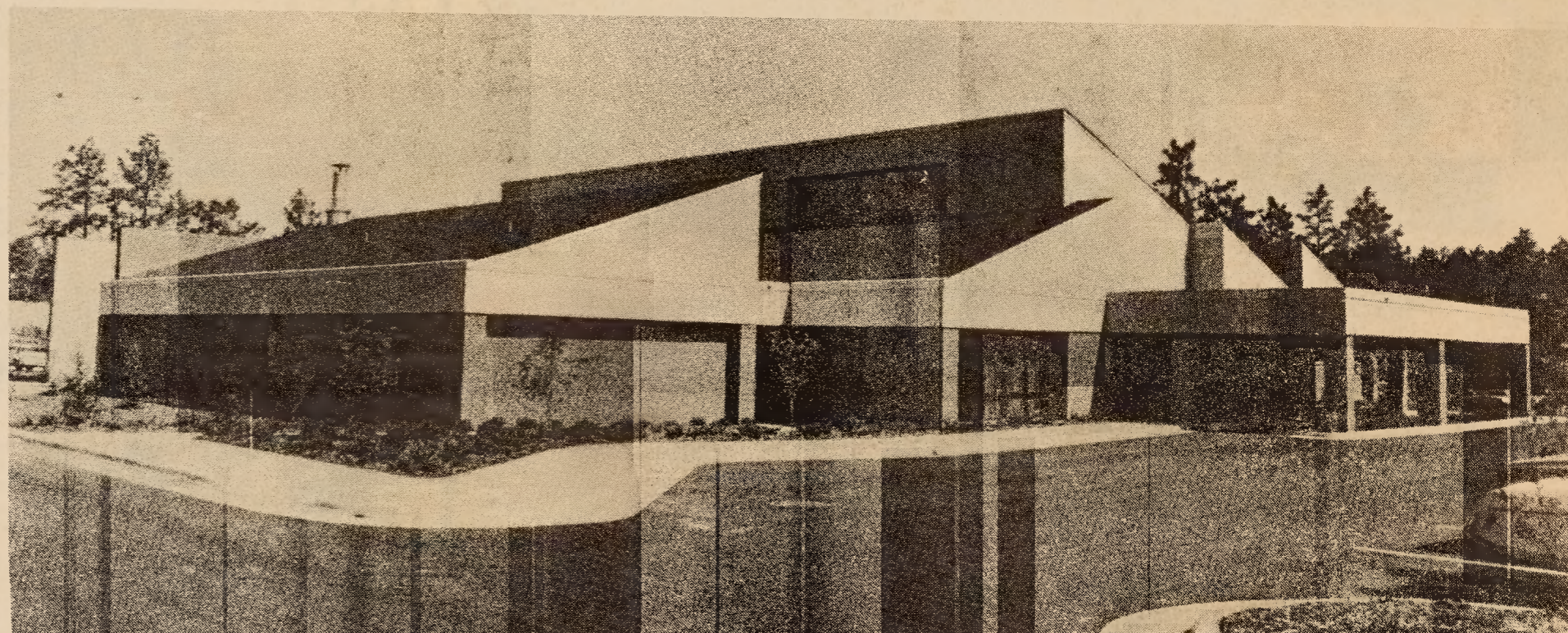

NEW \$2,500,000 AMBULATORY CENTER

The new ambulatory surgery center will provide to a projected 5,000 patients annually, the convenience and economy of Out-patient or "one-day" surgery and will house a Wellness Center for programs in preventive medicine and wellness. It is located 150 yards from

the hospital near the Pinehurst Surgical Clinic. The center consists of 16,000 square feet of working space with 4 operating rooms, a preparation and holding area, a large recovery area, reception and waiting area and normal support space.

AMBULATORY SURGERY BENEFITS:

- Reduction in out-patient surgery charges of between 20% and 30%.
- Reduction in waiting time for elective surgery.
- Added convenience to patient and doctor.
- More efficient use of physicians' time.
