George Jordan was relieved from paying poll tax.

Samuel Rayner placed on the outside pauper list and allowed \$4 per month.

Warren Massengill on outside pauper list and allowed \$2 per month.

Petition for new road from new road near J. B. Hardee's to Union Springs Church granted, the petitioners to pay all cost and damages.

The boundary lines of Wilson's Mills Township and Cleveland Township were defined by the Board.
