EDITORIAL ETCHINGS.

EX-PRESIDENT DAVIS, it is now thought, will not attend the Lee celebration in Richmond, Va., the last part of this month.

It is said that Minister Jarvis will resign his position as Minister to Brazil at an early day. He will return to North Carolina.

CONGRESSMAN S. S. COX, of New York, is mentioned for the chairmanship of the Ways and Means Committee of the next House. He is a decided advocate of tariff reform.

A DELEGATION of Texans called upon the President last week to urge the appointment of Judge A. H. Willis, of Texas, to the vacant place on the Supreme Court bench.

THE services of Gen. Roger A. Prior have been secured in behalf of the Chicago condemned Anarchists, with a view of carrying their case to the United States Supreme Court.

THE New York Tribune denounces Cleveland for turning out all the Republican office-holders. The Sun denounces him for keeping them in. The World denounces him for both.

SPEAKER CARLISLE will have an article in the Forum for October, setting forth the grounds upon which the Democratic party bases its expectation that it will be continued in power at Washington.

IN the State of Massachusetts the Federal officeholders number 4,047, of whom 3,289, or somewhat more than 80 per cent. are Republicans. And yet the Republican leaders say the civil service law is not enforced.

A CIRCULAR of deep-red Anarchistic tendencies is being circulated in Chicago. It is headed, "To the Working Men of the United States of North America," and denounces the action of the Supreme Court in upholding the decision of the lower Court in the Anarchist cases.

THE circular refers to Captain Bonfield as "the notorious police bandit," and villifies Judge Gary without stint. The circular is signed, "The Federation of Trades Unions," and was printed in New York. Their distribution has been forbidden by the Chicago authorities.

WILLIAM R. MORRISON, of Illinois, is noted for the perfect frankness and sincerity with which he expresses his opinions on public questions, as well as for great sagacity of his observations. His summary of the probabilities of the Democratic Presidential nomination is:

"The President is growing stronger all the time with the people, and will continue to grow stronger until the next Presidential election day comes around." The opinion expressed by the Illinois statesman is one from which it is difficult to discover anywhere sincere dissent.

THE operation of the law last winter, which repealed the statute authorizing the establishment of separate schools for colored pupils in Ohio is producing friction in many places. At Oxford, Ohio, the colored pupils nearly all deserted their own school and applied for admission to a white school. A public meeting was held and the school board was asked to order the colored pupils to their own school. The board complied with the request, and the colored people propose to apply for a mandamus. At Yellow Springs the School Board has ordered the schools closed indefinitely, or until the Legislature can meet and take some action.

SO we find that the Ohioans are no more in favor of the mixing of the races than we Southern people are. They wanted to inflict us with civil rights, but could not swallow the same dose themselves. A consistent set they are. We do not sympathize with them in the least in their troubles. They will, in the future, we surmise, not be so ready to inflict us with social equality, in as much as they have been bitten with the serpent themselves.

PROTECTION.

We have just read an able article in one of the leading papers of the nation says the Goldsboro Argus, claiming that with equal right should the laborers in the Pennsylvania mining regions demand protection against the importing of Hungarian slavoicks. We have practically excluded the world from competing in our home markets with their produce. We are not gradually excluding the men of the world from competing for the prizes that our great continent has in store for the industrious and the courageous. Thus does this insane idea of "protection" throw up one barrier after another between us and all other nations. This is a fatal error; what is worse, it is unchristian. Better far for the development both of our country and true manhood to go out upon the high seas and into the dark and unknown continents to contend for the mastery in all that ever will make a nation truly great.

TRAINING.

The right kind of education, says a recent writer, makes children honest, manly open-hearted, truthful and reliable. A child can just as well be trained to be truthful and kind as to be cunning and cruel. It all comes from the way he is treated. We are not natural born cut-throats and thieves. There is nothing so near heaven as the tender, loving heart of a child. He can be made either an angel or a devil. It all depends upon the way he is trained. Say even to a dog: "Get out of my way, you poor, miserable cur!" and the gentlest puppy will become a snarling, snapping, hateful dog. The meanest man on earth was started on the road of meanness by his teachers. Notice, we do not say school teachers. We say teachers. His companions, his books, his associations taught him. In this school he made a rapid advancement. From slang words, and then to oaths was his progress. Neither a child nor a man does what he was not at first taught to do.—Ez.

HUMOROUS SPEECH.

We give below one of President Cleveland's humorous speeches while at the "Clover Club." In explaining why he was there he said: "First, because I wanted to come. [Applause.] And second, because I could not resist the entreaties that sought to make me do something I oughtn't to do. [Applause.] Third, because I think this is the only place where I can meet the newspaper fraternity without being interviewed. [Laughter.] A voice, "He's a dandy." Fourth, because I believe in encouraging the sort of thing which I see going on about me [renewed laughter], for the reason that when newspaper men are engaged in this kind of business they are out of other mischief. [Uproarious laughter.]

THE LATEST.

Some of the Western papers have suggested the names of Lincoln and Grant as the Republican ticket for the next Presidential campaign. This dual arrangement would certainly derive great "luminosity" from the fame and names of their "daddies," and would be made more formidable should Fred. Grant be elected Secretary of State of New York in the coming election.

The Supreme Court, in general term, affirmed the judgment of conviction in the case of Jacob Sharp, all four of them concurring. The case can be appealed to the Court of Appeals, but Sharp will be sent to Sing Sing at once.
