The right of a publisher to extend credit for subscriptions to his publication is not denied or questioned, but his compliance or non compliance with this regulation will be taken into consideration in determining whether the publication is entitled to transmission at the second-class postage rate.

The Postmasters were ordered to put the above regulations into effect January 1, 1908, but upon the earnest solicitations of many publishers throughout the United States for an extension of time the Department has given until April 1, 1908, on which date the rules will be enforced.

We trust that our readers will look at the label on their paper, and if they find that they owe more than one year's subscription, that they will attend to it before April 1st. After that date we shall have to comply with the new ruling of the Post Office Department.
