



## ELDER L. H. HARDY ON "MUDHOLES OF DEBAUCHERY."

The opponents of Prohibition are telling it everywhere that the Primitive Baptists of North Carolina will vote as a unit against state prohibition. They are depending upon the vote of these upright, independent and liberty loving people to help them keep saloons and stills in North Carolina. They know as everybody knows, that the Primitive Baptists are zealous advocates of personal liberty and undying opponents of any connection between church and State. Every good citizen, who has seen encroachments upon liberty and the evils of even partial connection between church and state should be as zealous to oppose any encroachments as the staunch Primitive Baptists. If the pending State Prohibition law was an encroachment upon true personal liberty or perfect freedom to every man to worship God according to the dictates of his conscience, it ought to be defeated. It does not trench upon either of these essentials of liberty under the law and outlaws the greatest enemy of the church which was established to preserve ancient landmarks which our fathers have set.

Some days ago this paper quoted from the Gospel Messenger, edited by Elder Sylvester Hassell, an article about "the worst evil of all," which was declared to be intemperance. Last week we published an interview with Elder Harris, of Rockingham county, in which he depicted the evils caused by saloons and stills and said he would vote to give State Prohibition a fair trial. Below we quote the opinion of another Primitive Baptist preacher, Elder L. H. Hardy, of Rockingham county, who writing to Webster's Weekly says: "I believe that I have heard but three men express themselves as being for voting opposition to the Prohibition measure. They all appear to see that it is a moral necessity and privilege to vote for Prohibition.

"Look at the thing this way: Man's character should be as clean and tender as that of woman, therefore no man has a moral right to engage in any kind of business in which his wife might not stand side by side with him and not injure her moral character. Again no young man has a moral right to partake of anything or to engage in any business in which his sister or his best girl might not go side by side with him and retain her moral purity and virtue. How can a woman promise herself to marry a man whose character is not as good and as clean as her own? Can she hope to rescue him from the slums of degradation? Does she not know that the cloud on the forehead of his debauched character will have a tendency to pull her the other way? I feel like the mudholes of debauchery should be moved as far from the youthful eye and mind as it lies in our power to move them. If there are some left in the dark corners and allowed to skulk about as a sneaking serpent let it not be said that we have not used every effort in our power to remove them and condemn them both in precept and example."

These views show that the talk the Primitive Baptist people, who are the salt of the earth, will vote solidly against Prohibition does them a grievous wrong. They are an independent and conscientious people who will vote their honest convictions no matter what others may say. If they are convinced that State Prohibition will be best for mankind, reduce drunkenness, make better homes and aid in bettering their fellows, they will vote for it. They will follow the Right as God gives them to see the Right, and many of them will vote to lessen the whiskey evil in North Carolina. —News and Observer.
