PROHIBITION IN MEXICO.

Ordinance to be Passed That Will Close Up About Half the Saloons.

Mexico City, Jan. 11.-Governor Landa, of the federal district in which this city is situated, has prepared an ordinance which will be passed at an early meeting of the municipal council, limiting the number of saloons to one in every 600 feet.

This is equivalent to about two average city blocks. The passage of the ordinance will mean the closing of nearly one-half the saloons and pulque shops that are now in the city.
