

HE SAYS IT WILL BE AYCOCK.

To be the Great Southern Senator Says Ex-Governor Jarvis—Predicts That Ex-Governor Aycock Will be Nominated by an Overwhelming Majority—"The Folks Are For Him," He Declares.

"Charles B. Aycock would make the great Southern Senator," said ex-Governor T. J. Jarvis who was in the city yesterday, while following up matters connected with the Senatorial contest.

Ex-Governor Jarvis was here on his way to Trinity College commencement, and will attend the meeting of the Board of Education of the two conferences, remaining over Wednesday to hear the address of the Hon. Jacob Rife.

With reference to the Senatorial contest ex-Governor Jarvis said, "Ex-Governor Aycock will be nominated for United States Senator by an overwhelming majority. The folks are for him. After he goes to the United States Senate and gets acquainted with the customs and procedure he will be the great Southern Senator."

"I heard him speak at Snow Hill in a case a few days ago. It was a great speech, and in it there was Governor Aycock's old-time fire and ring. No one would suppose he had been sick. He goes ahead with affairs and is in fine shape. He is going to be the next United States Senator from North Carolina."—News and Observer, 6th.
