INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT OF

Reopening of Mill Will Mean Employment of About Five Hundred People Here

Raleigh, June 30. - The claim of \$308,086.93 income tax filed against the Ivanhoe Mills, of Smithfield, N. C., by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, Washington, D C., last January, was today disallowed by the Referee in bankrupt cy at a hearing of this case held in the Federal court room.

Live Wire Kills Clyde J. Mitchell

Former Resident of Smith field Working In Raleigh Dies at Touch of 2200 Volts Electricity

News reached here Wednesday that Clyde J. Mitchell, an employe of the Carolina Power and Light Company, formerly of this city but now of Raleigh, was electrocuted about 9:15 Wednesday morning while at work on a pole in Oberlin, a negro suburb of Ral-

eigh. He lived only a short time. According to the Raleigh Times the young man was badly burned on the hands and back when 2,200 volts of electricity passed through his body. He was working at the top of the pole and received the fatal shock when he is thought to have accidentally leaned against a ground wire while connecting the high voltage wires.
