

DEMOCRATS SHOWING GAINS IN STATE AS LATE RETURNS COME IN

DEMOCRATIC VOTERS HAVE PLACED CONFIDENCE IN THESE MEN

RETURNS POINT TO OVER 1000 MAJORITY FOR COUNTY TICKET

Only a Few of the Township Votes Are Available Today

The returns from the election yesterday are not official, but it now looks as if Johnston county has swung back into the Democratic line with fully 1,000 majority. Two years ago for various reasons Johnston county for the first time in more than a quarter of a century went Republican. The Democrats said that they defeated themselves by not going to the polls. Yesterday's vote was a vindication of this truth with the biggest vote in its history. It was an off political year throughout the State, but Johnston was an exception. The vote in Smithfield township yesterday was 1,427, the largest ever cast here.

Considerable comment has been made upon the work done by the women in this election. It is generally conceded that their help was of no small value in carrying the


