Charles W . Horne Is Now Bankrupt

Adjudication In Federal Court Follows Long, Bitterly Contested Hear ing; Trustee Not Yet Named

(News and Observer)

Charles W. Horne, Johnston county farmer and merchant who Tuesday night adjudicated a bankrupt by United States Judge Isaac M. Meekins, following a warmly contested hearing which stretched out through the day and lasted until 7:30 o'clock.

The order nullifies the proceedings in the State courts under which Dr. J. J. Young, of Clayton, have been administering the ramibe called by Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., referee in bankruptcy, in porary receiver.

"I'd like to do anything I can help Mr. Horne," declared Judge row turning round corner Meekins. "I think he is a wonder fully fine man and he needs every helping hand that can be extend ed to him and if the matter wer my discretion I should discharge him without hesitation, but if he is insolvent I shall have to adjudicate him a bankrupt."
