NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION AND NEW REGISTRATION OF VOTERS IN TERRITORY TO BE ANNEXED TO GLENDALE SPECIAL SCHOOL TAXING DISTRICT.

Notice is hereby given that a special election has been ordered to be held in the territory below described on Tuesday, December 20, 1927, to ascertain whether the voters in said territory are in favor of annually levying and collecting a special tax ad valorem on all taxable property in said territory of the same rate as that now being levied and collected in the Glendale Special School Taxing District, to-wit, not exceeding 50 cents on the \$100.00 worth of property for the purpose of supplementing the constitutional school term and for the further purpose of making said territory a permanent part of the said Glendale District and thereby equalizing school advantages in said territory.

The territory in which the said election is to be held is included in the following boundaries: "Beginning at a point where Mulatto Branch crosses the road from Stancil's Chapel to Hare's Store; thence down said Mulatto Branch to Little River; thence with said Little River to the Glendale Special School Taxing District line; thence with said School District line to the beginning."

On the day of said election the polls will open at sunrise and close at sunset. J. D. Stancil has been appointed registrar and Joe Cockrell and Joe Creech have been appointed poll holders. The old Price school house has been designated as polling place. The registration books will be open on every Saturday during registration at the polling place.

At said election those favoring the annually levying and collecting of said special tax shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "For Local Tax" and those who are opposed shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "Against Local Tax."

A new registration has been ordered for this special election. The registration books shall be kept open by the registrar for registration for those who are entitled to register in said territory from 9:00 o'clock a. m. until sunset on every day (Sundays excepted) beginning on Saturday, November 19, and ending on Saturday, December 10, 1927. On Saturday, December 17, 1927, the books will be open for challenges as provided by law.
