On November 11 we had a general get-together meeting at the school. The Little River Council of the Junior Order presented a Bible and flag to the school. Appropriate exercises were held in the auditorium which was crowded to its utmost capacity.

We had very impressive talks by Lawyer W. H. Lyon, Rev. Chester Alexander and George Ragsdale, to Smithfield, Rev. B. B. Deans, of Middlesex, E. T. Boyette, superintendent of Glendale-Chapel Consolidated Schools, and Wade Renfrow, a representative of our local school board. At the conclusion of the program the audience sang "America" after which the school children led the march to the flag pole where, after appropriate exercise the flag was left floating "O'er the Land of the Free and The Home of the Brave."

The crowd then gathered around a heavily-laden table and enjoyed an old-fashioned picnic dinner. A general good time was enjoyed by everybody.

All parents who have children under seven years of age who are to begin school this session are urged to send these children to school by November 20 or not send them at all this year. After that date it will be so inconvenient to take beginners into a class which has already made a start it will cause the entire class to be delayed. Therefore, it is a waste of time for the children and the teacher.
