corner of Lot No. 16 in said division and runs S 42 chs. to a hickory, thence E 15.50 chs. to a stake thence N 50 1/2° E 66 chs. to a birch, W. H. Sanders, corner on the bank of Neuse river, thence up said river to a sycamore, thence S 65° W 36 chs. to the beginning, containing 200 acres, and more fully described in book and page above referred to.

(d) Beginning at an oak, down on the old river and runs S 3° E 12.75 chs. to a stake; thence N 69° E 37 chs. to a sweet gum, thence N 65° East 36 poles to a yeamore on the banks of the river; thence up the upper mouth of the old river; thence on old river to the beginning, containing 168 acres and more fully described in book and page above referred to.
